Art Policy

Intent –

At Ormskirk West End we intend that children should master Art and Design to such an extent that they can go on to have careers within Art and Design and make use of art effectively in their everyday lives.

Our children will be taught Art and Design in a way that ensures progression of skills, and follows a sequence to build on previous learning. Our children will gain experience and skills of a wide range of formal elements of art in a way that will enhance their learning opportunities, enabling them to use art and design across a range of subjects to be creative and solve problems, ensuring they make progress.

Implementation –

We follow a broad and balanced Art and Design curriculum that builds on previous learning and provides both support and challenge for learners. We follow the National Curriculum and progression of skills and covers all aspects of the Art and Design curriculum.

Key stage 1

Pupils should be taught:

- to use a range of materials creatively to design and make products

- to use drawing, painting and sculpture to develop and share their ideas, experiences and imagination

- to develop a wide range of art and design techniques in using colour, pattern, texture, line, shape, form and space

 - about the work of a range of artists, craft makers and designers, describing the differences and similarities between different practices and disciplines, and making links to their own work.

Key stage 2

Pupils should be taught to develop their techniques, including their control and their use of materials, with creativity, experimentation and an increasing awareness of different kinds of art, craft and design.

Pupils should be taught:

- to create sketch books to record their observations and use them to review and revisit ideas
- to improve their mastery of art and design techniques, including drawing, painting and sculpture with a range of materials
- about great artists, architects and designers in history

All classes have art planned via our rolling curriculum. Opportunities for short art skills-based sessions are encouraged (e.g. line drawing, shading, colour mixing...) and these are to be recorded in sketch books.

All children (EYFS-Y6) have sketchbooks which are used to collate work, they are not for art outcomes but the journey of art. Sketchbooks should contain skills practise, information about artists, craftspeople and architects covered in classes and don't always have to be marked. Verbal feedback is expected. These sketchbooks can be used for reference and assessment. We want to ensure that Art and Design is embedded in our whole school curriculum and that opportunities for enhancing learning by using art are always taken.

Key vocabulary for units is identified and shared by staff, this can be seen on display boards for reference.

Art is progressive in the skills taught throughout year groups and key stages.

e.g.

Colour mixing	EYFS	KS1	LKS2	UKS2
	Explore through play-naming colours, knowing primary colours.	Primary and secondary colours, Hot colours	Tint and shades, mixing skin tones for portraits	Mixing colours to match backgrounds, recognising hot and cold colours and their effect on mood. Complimentary colours

Impact –

Children at Ormskirk West End will enjoy and value Art and Design and know why they are doing things, not just how. Children will understand and appreciate the value of Art and Design in the context of their personal wellbeing and the creative and cultural industries and their many career opportunities.

Progress in Art and Design is demonstrated through regularly reviewing and scrutinising children's work, in accordance with our Art and Design assessment policy to ensure that progression of skills is taking place. Namely through:

Looking at pupils' work, especially over time as they gain skills and knowledge

Observing how they perform in lessons

Talking to them about what they know.

The Art and Design curriculum will contribute to children's personal development in creativity, independence, judgement and self-reflection. This would be seen in them being able to talk confidently about their work, and sharing their work with others.

Progress will be shown through outcomes and through the important record of the process leading to them.
